There are a lot of reasons you may want to sell your home. Maybe your family has outgrown it. Maybe your last child is going off to college and it is just too much, now that you are empty nesters. Maybe a job change is requiring relocation. No matter the reason, preparing your home to fetch the highest price can be a daunting task. With the help of HGTV, we've put together the list of the upgrades sure to get the best return on your investment.

- 1. Minor bathroom remodel The average cost to completely gut your bathroom and start over is \$10,500. Your resell will go up by about \$200 or only 2 percent. Instead, caulk around the tub. If the tub is old, re-glaze it instead of replace it. Replace old wall coverings with a fresh coat of paint. You will be done for a fraction of the cost.
- 2. Landscaping The average homeowner spends nearly \$5000 between updated landscaping and a designer. You will likely only break even on your investment. Save some money by going to your local nursery and asking for free design services. Add a splash of color and depth to your entry by getting a variety of plants the same color but varying heights. Remove overgrown shrubbery and put in a variety of flowering plants instead.
- **3.** Minor kitchen remodel With an average cost of \$14,900, the average value added to the home is only \$14,600, or 98.5 percent. Consider re-facing or painting your cabinets yourself. Pay for the more difficult tasks like laying new flooring, installing recessed lights and new countertop. Other touches include new appliances.
- **4. Exterior Improvements** Think vinyl siding, paint and an updated front entry. A fresh coat of paint is much cheaper than vinyl siding, which comes in at about \$7,300 for 1,250 sq. ft. Meanwhile, one gallon of paint will cover approximately 400 sq. ft. Painting may be the way to go for your budget. When it comes to your front entry, consider updating a tired looking wrought iron railing, with an updated wood look or a fresh coat of paint. Entry updates recoup approximately 95 percent at resell.
- 5. Replacement Windows Sadly, they recoup less than 90 percent of their cost, but if your windows are in bad shape replacing them may be necessary to sell the house. Cities such as Chicago, Seattle, NYC, Miami, Orlando and Boston typically see a better than 100 percent return on their investment. Look for windows that add a specific benefit for your climate. For example, if you live in a desert climate, look for low E glass to help reflect the heat and improve your return.

These are just a few things you can do to help sell your house for the best possible price. There are countless other things you can do to speed up the process, but look at the list and decide what's essential. Then look at your budget what you can afford. Keep in mind, the more work you can handle yourself the lower the costs will be.
